JACKIE & JOSEPH GET MARRIED

Those of you who have been with us for a while know that we've been working with Jackie & Joseph, a black couple from Puerto Viejo. They've each entered rehabilitation facilities for addiction and are working through the program. You also know that Dennis & Terrie Atkinson, a Christian missionary couple, visited here and and prayed with J & J. Then Terrie took a ring from her finger, and gave it to Nanci to hold for when the two got married. They tied the knot at the women's rehab center on Wednesday. We went to the wedding, and since 13-year-old Carmelita and 10-year-old Irene had formed a real friendship with Jackie while she was here, we took them with with us.

After the wedding, they were given a two-day conjugal visit, then it's back to their respective shelters again for another nine months.

As we looked at maps and asked around about the location of this place – on the north east outskirts of San José – we noticed that people were reluctant to tell us where it was. As we got closer we started to hear warnings about the area – very dangerous, very violent. “Not even the police will go in there”, an armed bank guard said.

So we did the only thing we could do – we went in anyway.

The wedding went off fine, and the minister, Victor Fullas Saboria, took it on himself to ride with us and guide us out of the area.

Amanda doesn't speak Spanish (yet), and Carmelita doesn't speak English (yet). We can't wait to see how this comes out!

AN OPPORTUNITY

Every so often, we run into a great opportunity, with the potential to make a lot of profit. Unless it's directly connected to what we're doing at The Bridge, we can't add it to our plate of things to do. Some days, we feel like we're too busy already.

However, we ran into an opportunity recently which, because of timing, location, and business positioning, could be a good opportunity for someone who intends to be in Costa Rican real estate. Since it would be partnering with an organization that has been very supportive of The Bridge, we thought we'd report it here. The project is in Costa Rica's north-central zone.

It's not for the casual investor. It's a half completed real estate development where whatever gets built sells out. It's in a high-demand area, The construction is classy, the people involved have their heads screwed on right – wherever they go, they include the local families living in or near the area, and bring them into opportunities to benefit as well, They work very hard to minimize their impact on the environment, ensuring that the area stays "green", often at the expense of profit. The situation now available requires an investment of \$100,000. The potential return is much greater than that.

I've been around this kind of business for a long time, and I'd rather not get any deeper in describing either the property, the investment needed, or the opportunity. This is best done between the principals and potential investors. I wouldn't want to bore the rest of you with the details. I have a feeling this opportunity won't last for long. THE NEW BAMBOO

One of the projects you'll also see coming up will be work done to assist with the growing, harvesting, and using of guadua bamboo. Basically, it's a way of generating revenue for groups of indigenous families. Here's how it works in a nutshell.

- Guadua removes much more carbon dioxide from the air than "normal" jungle trees;
- It produces significantly more oxygen than "normal" jungle trees;

To produce revenue:

- It can be processed into furniture, and into construction materials;
- Government agencies and private companies pay for "carbon credits" – cash paid per ton of carbon dioxide "sequestered" from the atmosphere. Since Guadua is more effective than "normal" jungle trees, this is expected to produce significant revenue for the indigenous groups who participate.


